REPLY.

MY DEAR BRETHREN OF THE CLERGY AND LAITY:

Your unanimous and most kind address is as gratifying as it is unexpected. I most heartily thank you for it, as an evidence of the warm feeling and affection which you entertain towards your Bishop, and which, I humbly trust, will continue to cheer me in my efforts to serve you, as long as it pleases God to spare my life.

In regard to the Lambeth Conference, I can claim no distinction beyond that of a peace-maker, and of an earnest endeavour to extend toleration to all who honestly subscribe to the Formularies, and endeavour to carry into effect what they deem to be the plain rules of our Church.

I thank you for your congratulations on my election by the House of Bishops to be the Metropolitan of Canada. I shall do all in my power to show myself not undeserving of so high an honour, and of your good opinion of me. But honourable as that title is, the name of the Bishop of Fredericton is dearer to me. It reminds me of many a trial, of constant labour in your service, of willing support, and faithful affection; of many a beloved fellow-labourer, now called to his rest; of a Cathedral Church, where, for many years, the faithful have offered a daily sacrifice, and where a body of earnest young men have received the grace of Holy Orders; of "Psalms and hymns and spiritual songs" wafted to the throne of God, and chanted, as we hope, with fresh purity by those who have "washed their robes, and made them white in the blood of the Lamb."

My tongue must indeed "cleave to the roof of my mouth," if I forget the title which I never sought, but which continually reminds me, amidst the "troubles and adversities which God has shewed me," that He was pleased to "bring me to great honour, and to comfort me on every side."

Moved by Mr. G. D. Street, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

That the Canon for the election of a Coadjutor Bishop be taken up for discussion this day at half-past two o'clock.

To which it was moved, in amendment, by Rev. R. E. Smith, seconded by Rev. J. R. Campbell,

That the discussion of the Canon be taken up at once.

*Carried.*

Moved by Rev. L. A. Hoyt, seconded by Mr. H. A. Johnson, That in the discussion of the Canon for the appointment of a Coadjutor, speakers shall be confined to ten minutes, except the mover and seconder, who shall be confined to twenty minutes, unless by special permission of the Synod.

After some discussion, this motion was, by permission, withdrawn.

Moved by Mr. G. D. Street, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

That the proposed Canon for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor be received, and taken into consideration, section by section. *Carried.*

CANON

*For the appointment and election of a Bishop Coadjutor.*

1. Whenever at the request of the Bishop of the Diocese, or—if the Bishop should be mentally incapacitated—then whenever without such request the Synod shall by resolution declare it to be advisable that a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese should be appointed, the election of such Coadjutor shall, either at the meeting of the Synod at which such resolution shall be passed, or at a special meeting to be called for that purpose, be proceeded with in the manner hereinafter provided.
2. The Bishop shall submit to the Synod the name or names of one or more persons in Holy Orders in the Church of England and Ireland in Canada, or in some Church in full communion therewith, for election as such Bishop Coadjutor.
3. Upon such nomination being made by the Bishop, the Synod shall proceed to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.
4. Such election shall be by ballot, and the votes of at least two-thirds of the Clergy, and two-thirds of the lay delegates present, shall be required to elect such Coadjutor.
5. Should the Synod fail to elect on such nomination, the Bishop may make a further nomination, and so from time to time; and the election upon any such further nomination shall be proceeded with as hereinbefore provided.
6. Should the Bishop decline to make a further nomination in any such case, the proceedings for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor shall cease.

7. Should the Bishop at any time become so incapacitated by mental infirmity as to be unable to discharge the duties of his office, the Synod may, if it see fit, proceed to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor in like manner as in the case of a vacancy in the See.
8. When any person is duly elected Bishop Coadjutor, it shall be the duty of the Bishop, or of the Synod, forthwith to notify the Metropolitan of such election, in order that the consecration of such Coadjutor may be proceeded with as in the case of Bishops of Sees in the Province of Canada.
9. The Bishop Coadjutor elect shall, before his consecration, make and subscribe before the Metropolitan, or some person appointed by him, the following declaration:
 

"I, A. B., elected Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Fredericton, do promise that I will teach and maintain the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England. And I do also declare that I consent to be bound by all the rules and regulations which have been made, or which may hereafter be made by the Synod of the said Diocese; and I hereby agree immediately to resign the said office of Coadjutor, together with all the rights and emoluments appertaining thereto, if sentence requiring such resignation shall at any time be passed upon me, after due examination and trial had by the Tribunal appointed by the Synod of the Diocese for the trial of a Bishop, saving all right of appeal allowed by the said Synod."
10. The said declaration, or a certified copy thereof, shall be forthwith filed with the Secretary of the Synod.
11. The Bishop Coadjutor shall perform such Diocesan duties, and exercise such Episcopal functions, as the Bishop may assign him; or, in case of the mental incapacity of the Bishop, such duties and functions, as the Bishop himself might have exercised but for such incapacity.
12. Should any difference arise between the Bishop and his Coadjutor relative to their respective rights and duties, it shall be referred to, and decided by, the House of Bishops of the province of Canada.
13. The Bishop Coadjutor, when duly consecrated, shall have the right of succession to the See of Fredericton, and shall succeed to the same immediately upon its becoming vacant, and shall be installed as such according to the Canons of the Province of Canada.
14. The Bishop Coadjutor shall have a seat in the Diocesan Synod, and the same right of voting therein as any Priest of the Diocese sitting in such Synod.
15. The provisions of this Canon so far as they relate to nomination by the Bishop shall not extend beyond the Episcopate of the present Diocesan, unless the Synod shall otherwise order.

(The Bishop is willing to accept the addition of the last section if the Synod desires it.)

Moved by Rev. Dr. Ketchum, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

That the Rev. Dr. Nichols, of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, now present at this meeting, be requested to take a seat on the floor of this house. *Carried.*

Mr. G. D. Street then moved that the first section of the proposed Canon be adopted.

Moved, in amendment, by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by Rev. E. S. W. Pentreath,

That the word "present" be inserted in the first line, before the word Bishop, when it occurs. *Lost.*

Moved, in amendment, by Rev. G. M. Armstrong, seconded by Rev. G. Schofield, that the first line read thus:—

"Whenever at the request of the Bishop of the Diocese, feeling physically incapacitated."

Moved, in amendment to the amendment, by Rev. L. A. Hoyt, seconded by Rev. Joseph Rushton,

"Whenever, either at the request of the Bishop of the Diocese, or without such request, should the Bishop be mentally incapacitated, the Synod shall by resolution declare it to be advisable," etc. *Carried.*

Moved, in amendment, by Rev. F. H. Almon, seconded by Rev. J. Rushton,

To strike out the words "either at the meeting of the Synod at which such resolution shall be passed, or." *Lost.*

Moved, in amendment, by Mr. E. B. Chandler, Jr., seconded by Rev. J. R. Campbell,

To insert the words "or at any subsequent annual meeting" after the words "shall be passed."

On motion, the Synod adjourned until 2.30 P. M.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Synod met pursuant to adjournment.

Debate was resumed on Mr. Chandler's amendment, which was put to the house and *carried.*

Moved by Rev. L. A. Hoyt, seconded by Mr. E. B. Chandler, That this Synod do adjourn at 6 P.M. until 7.30 P.M. *Carried.*

It was moved by Mr. G. D. Street, seconded by Rev. E. A. Warneford,

That section two of the proposed Canon be adopted.

To which it was moved, in amendment, by Rev. G. Schofield, seconded by Mr. G. S. Grimmer,

That the following words be added to the section:—

“And after such nomination by the Bishop, any three of the Clergy, or any three of the Lay delegates to the Synod, may place in nomination the name or names of any other person or persons duly qualified as aforesaid.”

After long debate, conducted with the utmost cordiality and good feeling, it was moved by Rev. F. H. Almon, and supported, in accordance with the usage of the Synod, by two other members,

That the vote be taken by Orders.

The Chair appointed Mr. W. M. Jarvis and Mr. G. A. Schofield, tellers.

The amendment being first put, the vote was as follows:—

Clergy, for the amendment, 7; against, 52.

Laity, “ “ 13; “ 50.

The amendment was accordingly *lost*.

The second section was then put, and carried by a large majority.

The Synod then adjourned until 7.30 o'clock.

#### EVENING SESSION.

The Synod met pursuant to adjournment.

On motion, the Secretary was instructed suitably to acknowledge the kindness of the Society of Odd Fellows in giving the Synod the use of their fine Hall without expense.

The Secretary laid on the table the accounts of the Contingent Fund. The Chair appointed Mr. G. W. Whitney a committee to audit the same.

On motion, it was *resolved* that the Synod do adjourn this evening at 10 o'clock until to-morrow, Thursday, at 9.30 A. M.

Moved by Mr. G. A. Blair, seconded by Mr. John Sears,

That section three of the Canon be adopted. *Carried*.

Moved by Mr. W. Wilkinson, seconded by Mr. G. W. Whitney,

That section four of the Canon be adopted, with the addition of the word “present” after the word “clergy.” *Carried*.

Moved by Mr. John Sears, seconded by Mr. T. B. Robinson, That section five be adopted. *Carried*.

Moved by Mr. G. A. Blair, seconded by Mr. W. Wilkinson, That section six be adopted.

To which it was moved, in amendment, by Mr. T. W. Daniel, seconded by Rev. J. R. Campbell,

That the sixth section read as follows:

“Should the Bishop decline to make any further nomination, in such case the proceedings for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor shall cease for that session.” *Carried*.

Moved by Mr. W. Wilkinson, seconded by Rev. W. LeB. McKiel,

That section seven be adopted. *Carried*.

Moved by Mr. John Sears, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

That section eight be adopted. *Carried*.

Moved by Mr. W. Wilkinson, seconded by Mr. G. D. Street,

That section nine be adopted.

Moved, in amendment, by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. E. B. Chandler, Jr.,

To insert after “said office of Coadjutor,” the words “and all Episcopal office in the said See of Fredericton.” *Lost*.

The original motion was then put and *carried*.

Moved by Mr. W. Wilkinson, seconded by Mr. T. B. Robinson, That section ten be adopted. *Carried*.

Moved by Mr. G. A. Blair, seconded by Mr. G. W. Whitney, That section eleven be adopted. *Carried*.

Moved by Rev. H. H. Barber, seconded by Mr. S. Foster,

That section twelve be adopted. *Carried*.

Moved by Mr. G. A. Blair, seconded by Rev. J. R. Campbell,

That section thirteen be adopted.

Moved, in amendment, by Mr. G. R. Parkin, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

To insert after the words "and shall be installed," the words "as Bishop of the said See;" and after the words "Province of Canada," the words "provided that previous to his installation he make the declaration required of a Bishop chosen by the Canon of 1871 of this Diocese." *Carried.*

Moved by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by Rev. E. A. Warneford,

That section fourteen be adopted. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. E. B. Chandler, Jr., seconded by Rev. J. H. Talbot,

That section fifteen be adopted. *Carried on a division; yeas 67, nays 50.*

Moved by Mr. G. D. Street, seconded by Mr. E. B. Chandler, Jr.,

That the Canon, as amended, be now adopted. *Carried.*

On motion, the Synod adjourned.

## SECOND DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 9, 1879.

The Synod met pursuant to adjournment. The Lord Bishop in the Chair.

Prayers.

The roll of the Clergy and Lay delegates was called. The minutes of the previous day's session were read, and on motion, confirmed.

The Lord Bishop then read the following document:—

*To the Synod of the Diocese of Fredericton:*

"Being of opinion that it is for the best interests of the Diocese that I should have assistance in the discharge of the onerous duties of the Episcopal office, I hereby request the Synod to declare it to be advisable that a Bishop Coadjutor for this Diocese should be appointed."

Moved by Mr. W. Wilkinson, seconded by Mr. G. D. Street,

*Resolved,* That in accordance with the request of his Lordship the Bishop, this Synod do now declare it to be advisable that a Bishop Coadjutor for this Diocese should be appointed.

*Carried unanimously.*

The Lord Bishop then addressed the Synod, pointing out his reasons why he was not prepared to propose any name or names for election, and why he preferred to wait; also renewing his offer to set aside one half his official income, namely, £500 stg., as the salary of the Coadjutor, when he should be appointed.

Moved by Rev. L. A. Hoyt, seconded by Mr. John Sears,

Whereas the Bishop has kindly offered the half of his official income derived from the Colonial Bishoprics' fund for the support of the Coadjutor, *Resolved,* That the Synod thankfully accept his generous offer until further arrangements can be made. *Carried.*

Mr. G. W. Whitney made a verbal report as Auditor of the Secretary's accounts, and stated that he had examined them with the vouchers, and found them correct.

On motion, the report was received.

Moved by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by Mr. Hurd Peters,

That the Synod proceed to the election of the Standing Committee of the Board of Foreign Missions by nomination and ballot. *Carried.*

The following Clergy were nominated: Revs. G. G. Roberts, E. S. W. Pentreath, T. E. Dowling, G. Armstrong, Canon Brigstocke, Canon Medley, R. M. Edwards, G. H. Sterling.

On motion, the nominations closed.

On motion, the nominations closed.

The Chairman appointed Messrs. E. B. Chandler, Jr. and J. DeLancey Robinson, tellers.

Moved by Mr. J. DeLancey Robinson, seconded by Mr. E. B. Chandler, Jr.,

That the nomination for Lay members of the Board of Foreign Missions be re-opened. *Lost.*

Moved by Rev. T. E. Dowling, seconded by Rev. G. H. Sterling,

That the Report of the Board of Foreign Missions be re-

ceived and taken as read, and ordered to be printed in the next Journal of the Synod. *Carried.* (See Appendix A.)

Moved by Rev. J. Rushton, seconded by Reverend Canon Ketchum,

That the next annual meeting of the Synod be held in St. John on the Wednesday before the first Thursday in July, 1880. *Carried.*

Rev. E. S. W. Pentreath presented and read the Report of the Sunday School Committee.

Moved by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by Mr. W. M. Jarvis,

That the Report on Sunday Schools be received and printed in the Journal, and that a Committee be appointed to take into consideration the various recommendations submitted in the Report, and take such steps as they may deem advisable towards carrying them into effect. *Carried.*

The Committee on Sunday Schools beg to submit the following

#### REPORT.

Your Committee feel that this is one of the most important subjects that can come before the Synod. In this age of great intellectual activity and increased attention to and facilities for secular education, it is more incumbent that the Church provide for the young a system of sound religious instruction. Indeed, we feel that she fails in discharging an essential part of her work as long as she neglects to make adequate provision for the same.

And we feel that the most practicable way in which this can be made is by establishing in every district an efficient School.

We are aware that the Sunday School is not a substitute for, but a supplement to that home training which the children should receive.

But at the same time we do not forget that in most cases religious instruction is not imparted at home, and that the religious education of the children practically depends on the teaching received in the Sunday School. Twenty-five hours per week are not considered too much to devote to the development of the mind, while two hours a week only are available for instruction in religion. And more than this, the secular schools are officered by competent teachers, who after due examination have been licensed, the scholars are graded, and the same system of teaching is enforced; while Sunday Schools are too often carried on with teachers not duly qualified, and in the majority of cases no systematic instruction. It cannot be denied that the results are often very unsatisfactory.

Your Committee have received important information from the Clergy of the Diocese, and they find that there is a general attempt among the Clergy, each in his own way, in the face of many hindrances, to make a good use of Sunday Schools. But there is no regular system of graded instruction, and there is a general complaint of the lack of qualified teachers, the lukewarmness of parents, and the difficulty in scattered missions of bringing the children together. Your Committee see in this lack of qualified teachers a great source of weakness, and an evidence of the need of increased interest by the Church in Sunday School work.

We beg to submit the following suggestions:

I. That your Committee recommend the formation in each Deanery, or District, as may be thought best, of a Sunday School Association, similar to one which they understand is in successful operation in the Deanery of St. John.

II. That such Association be requested yearly to send a Report to a Standing Committee on Sunday Schools, which may be appointed by the Synod, giving the answers to such statistical questions as may be agreed upon, and affiliated to the Church of England Sunday School Institute in England.

III. That an attempt be made to secure as far as possible a uniform system of Lessons, and to procure the most approved materials, and adopt the best methods of Sunday School work.

IV. That to secure this end, there be a head quarters in Saint John, where there may be kept appliances for Sunday School work, and a competent person appointed who will give information and advice to the Clergy who may desire to improve their Schools.

V. That the attention of such Associations be specially directed to the following subjects:—

- (a) The inspection half-yearly of the Sunday Schools connected with them by some competent person.
- (b) The voluntary examination of Sunday School Teachers by the Church of England Sunday School Institute of England, as such is conducted in the Dioceses of Toronto, Ontario, and elsewhere.
- (c) The holding of meetings of the Sunday School Teachers connected with the Society.
- (d) The holding of services for the Teachers.
- (e) The holding of regular children's services.

The Rev. G. G. Roberts presented and read the Report of the Committee on the Divinity School.

Moved by Rev. Dr. Ketchum, seconded by Rev. T. E. Dowling,

That the Report be received and made the order of the day at half-past two. *Carried.*

The Committee appointed at the last meeting of the Synod to take such steps as might be necessary for the establishment of a Divinity School at Fredericton, in connection with the Cathedral,

**REPORT:**

That they met His Lordship the Bishop, and proceeded to consider the matter so referred to them, and agreed to the following Rules and Regulations for the government of the proposed School:

I. The Governing Body of said School shall be his Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese, with four clergymen and four laymen, members of the Synod. Such clergymen and laymen to be elected by nomination and ballot at each annual meeting of the Synod.

II. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be the Visitor of the School, and shall be authorised to prepare from time to time such Rules and Regulations as he may deem necessary for its internal government, subject to the control of the Governing Body, and in conjunction with the Principal of the said School shall, subject as aforesaid, prescribe the course of study therein.

III. The general management of the School, and the collection and control of all funds for its support shall be vested in the Governing Body.

IV. The Principal of the said School shall be a Clergyman in Priest's orders, and shall be nominated by the Bishop, subject to the approval of the majority of the other Members of the Governing Body.

V. Any Officer of the School may be dismissed by the vote of a majority of all the members of the Governing Body.

VI. The Visitor shall have power to suspend any Officer of the School, provided that he shall forthwith summon a meeting of the Governing Body to be held within one month from the date of such suspension, and shall submit for their consideration and decision his reasons for such suspension.

VII. The Governing Body shall meet at Fredericton for the transaction of general business on the second Wednesday in January in each year.

VIII. Special meetings may be called at any time by the Bishop, or in case of his absence or inability to act, by any three members of the Governing Body. Notices of all meetings shall be sent by post, except

when the Synod is in Session, to the address of each member, at least seven days before the time of such meetings.

IX. A majority of the Governing Body, of whom the Bishop shall be one, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, provided that in case of the absence of the Bishop a majority of the other members may elect a Chairman and proceed with the business.

The Committee have also made application to a number of persons for contributions for the support of the School for a period of five years, and have received promises of annual subscriptions towards the object during that period to the amount of nine hundred dollars (\$900), and a grant of \$200 from the Diocesan Church Society; and they have reason to believe that further contributions may still be obtained.

That section VII. be adopted. *Carried.*

That section VIII. be adopted. *Carried.*

Moved by Rev. G. G. Roberts, seconded by Rev. Dr. Ketchum,

That section IX. be adopted. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. G. R. Parkin, seconded by Rev. Dr. Ketchum,

That the Synod reconsider the second clause of the first rule, already carried. *Carried.*

Moved by Rev. G. G. Roberts, seconded by Rev. F. H. Almon,

That the words "annually by the Synod" be inserted after

"elected;" and that the words "at each annual meeting of the Synod" be struck out. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. G. R. Parkin, seconded by Rev. Dr. Ketchum, Whereas, in the opinion of this Synod, the organization of the proposed Divinity School should be proceeded with as soon as possible, therefore

*Resolved,* That the Synod now proceed to the election of a Governing Body, as provided by section 1 of the rules adopted by the Synod.

Moved, in amendment, by Rev. J. H. Talbot, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

That the regulations embodied in this Report shall not be put in force unless an adequate endowment has first been raised. *Lost.*

The original motion was then put, and *carried.*

At 5 o'clock, his Lordship stating that he had another appointment which must be kept, it was moved and seconded that the Hon. Chief Justice take the Chair.

Moved, in amendment, that the Synod do adjourn till tomorrow, Friday, at 9.30 A. M. *Lost.*

The original resolution was then put, and *carried.*

Whereupon the Hon. Chief Justice took the Chair.

The vote being taken on the amendment of Rev. Canon Brigstocke, it was *carried on a division*; yeas 51; nays 32.

After some debate, both the motion and the amendment were, by permission of the Synod, withdrawn.

Moved by Rev. L. G. Stevens, seconded by Rev. R. M. Edwards,

*Resolved*, That this Synod, before which matters of so grave and delicate a nature have been brought, bear witness of our high appreciation of the dignity, the candour, the patience, and the impartiality which have characterized His Lordship's bearing and utterances in presiding; our renewed love and respect for His Lordship; our wish and prayer that he may long be spared to us; and our earnest thanks to Almighty God that the deliberations of this Synod have been so eminently free from the spirit of bitterness and party strife, happily issuing in that harmony which comes from acting "in the unity of the Spirit and in the bond of peace." *Carried unanimously by a standing vote.*

The Bishop made a most cordial and happy reply.

The attention of the Chair having been drawn to the smallness of the house, it was found that there were not sufficient Laymen present to constitute a quorum.

Whereupon, the doxology having been sung, His Lordship pronounced the benediction, and the session came to an end.

### FIFTH REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS FOR THE DIOCESE OF FREDERICTON.

Established by the Diocesan Synod A. D. 1874.

*To the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton:*

The Board of Foreign Missions begs to submit the following Report:  
*Remittances, 1878-9.*—During the past year the Board has remitted the sum of \$1620.48 to the five Missionary objects directed by the donors, the full details of which are submitted herewith in the Treasurer's Account, which has been distributed as follows:

*Annual Meetings.*—The Board held its Fourth Annual Meeting in St. Paul's Church Sunday School House, Portland, on Tuesday evening, July 2nd, under the presidency of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor, when Addresses were delivered by the Reverends Canon Medley, E. S. W. Pentreath, N. M. Hansen, and Mr. H. P. Petersen, lay delegate from New Denmark.

*Parochial Missionary Meetings.*—During the week of Intercession for Missions (December 2-7), eight Parochial Missionary Meetings were held in connection with the Board in St. John, Carleton, and Portland.

On the last day of Intercession, May 20th, a United Service was held in St. John's Church, St. John, when an appeal was made on behalf of the Diocese of Algoma. On the Ascension Day the Annual Service for the Church Sunday School Children of St. John, Carleton and Portland was held in St. Paul's Church, and the Collection was set apart for the Indian Homes for Children at Sault Ste. Marie.

*Fourth Annual Report.*—Five Hundred copies of the Fourth Report of the Board were printed and circulated throughout the Diocese, and the information thus afforded has not been fruitless.

The Collections during the present year are in advance of those reported in 1878, and the Board records this steady increase with satis-

faction. This increase has been, no doubt, in part due to the change of the Week of Intercession and consequent occurrence of two periods for Mission Services in the year.

*Receipts, 1875-79.*—The estimates of the sum remitted through the Board of Foreign Missions since 1875, are as follows:

*Salary of the Bishop of Algoma.*—The Board respectfully wishes to draw attention to a section of a letter addressed by the Diocesan to the Synod at its last session. The passage is as follows: "It is my duty to apprise you that I was informed in Montreal that each Diocese was expected to contribute annually \$200 to the salary of the Bishop of Algoma, and that our Diocese was the only one which had not so contributed. I had never heard of such an agreement before, nor do I know how the sum can be provided. But if the Synod should think fit to pass a resolution on the subject, I can only say that I will readily co-operate in any practical measure to accomplish the end proposed. The sums hitherto collected in this Diocese have been given to Missionary objects in the Diocese of Algoma, not to the salary of the Bishop."

No definite action having been taken by the Synod, the Board feels at liberty to state the facts of the case, as well as to express an opinion.

It was by the deliberate action of the five Dioceses of the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, first in Diocesan Synod, and then, by their representatives in Provincial Synod, that the Missionary Diocese of Algoma was formally set apart from the Diocese of Toronto, with the express understanding that the Bishop and Missionary Staff should be supported by these five Dioceses. Bishop Fauquier was elected at a special session of the Provincial Synod in September, 1873, the following Dioceses being represented, viz: Quebec, Toronto, Montreal, Huron, and Ontario. It was not until July, 1874, that the Diocese of Fredericton united itself with the Provincial Synod of Canada.

Bearing this in mind, the Board, while most anxious to help in all its branches Church work in Algoma, most respectfully declines to recognize any *claims*, and can only urge the wants of this Missionary field as one of its many voluntary undertakings.

The Board gladly circulated among the Clergy of the Diocese a Pastoral Letter from the Canadian Bishops, dated May 1st, 1879, in which they "earnestly call upon all, both clergymen and laymen, according to their ability, systematically and continuously to give of their worldly substance to the Missionary Fund of the Diocese of Algoma."

During the Week of Intercession for Missions in May last, the fol-

lowing Parishes responded to this special appeal, viz: Woodstock; Fredericton Cathedral; Kingston, King's Co.; St. Jude's, Carleton; Moncton; Sussex; Point du Chene; Petitcodiac; St. George's, Carleton; Fairville; St. John's Church, St. John; St. James' Church, St. John; Sackville; Hampton; Edmundston; New Maryland; Kingsclear; St. Paul's, Portland; St. Andrews; Chamcook; Trinity Church, St. John; Richibucto; Weldford; Christ Church, St. Stephen; Dorchester; Gagetown; Campobello; Upham; Albert; Manguerville; Musquash; Westfield; Newcastle; Chatham; Shediac; Christ Church, Fredericton; St. George; Penfield; and Kingston, Kent Co.

Last year the united contributions for these objects in Algoma amounted to \$604 86. This year they are \$949 67.

*Spiritual Destitution.*—Attention was drawn at length in last year's Report to the work and requirements of the Homes for Indian Children. Owing to the rapid influx of immigrants of late, the cry for the ministrations of the Church is making itself heard. The population was increased from 15,000 in 1874 to upwards of 60,000 in 1878.

One instance of the barrenness of this Missionary field may be cited: it is in the Muskoka territory. The spiritual destitution is frightful. Mr. G. E. Harrison writes as follows: "Over 40,000 souls have moved into this district within the last twelve months, and most of them have hardly a cent to buy bread with. The nearest Church is twenty miles south of us, and there is none north, though the country is settled for fifty miles north of us. The Settlers are crying out for a Church, and have promised all the help they can give in the way of labour; but we are without money to buy timber, or to pay a Clergyman. . . . I have bought four acres for a Church, Parsonage and Glebe, and by the Bishop's wish, I read the Service every Sunday in a shanty near us, and a Clergyman who the Bishop knows and likes well, has promised to come on a minimum stipend, if we can only raise it. . . . Think of all these people who have enjoyed so many advantages up to lately, now without any Church to worship in, or Clergyman to visit them. . . . For the love of God do not turn away and leave us starving in this way, but send us help."

*The first Offering for Trinity Church, St. John.*—Allusion is made in the last printed statement of the Annual Accounts of Trinity Church, St. John, to the first offering for the new Church. It is of special interest. Two of the boys of the Shingwauk Home were spectators at "the Fire." Ten months afterwards the Secretary received the following interesting letter:

"Shingwauk Home, April 16, 1878. Dear Sir,—We have had collections during Lent to help to re-build the Trinity Church at St. John, which was burnt down last summer. There were forty-seven of us, and we all voted whether to send it to St. John, or to the Indians at Garden

River, or to Africa, or to India, and all the boys wanted it to be sent to St. John. We are very thankful to you people for helping us so much for our homes. We are trying if any wants to follow the SAVIOUR to deny himself, so I think some of the boys have been trying to do it. So now I want to conclude with my best wish to you, JOHN ESQUIMAUX, Captain of the Shingwauk Home."

The sum enclosed was \$8.15.

In conclusion, the Board desires to enter into the spirit of the letter lately addressed to the Bishops of the Anglican Communion by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts:

"We recognize abundant cause for thankfulness in (1) the thought that Christians did not turn a deaf ear to the appeals of the Society, but that money has been offered liberally, first for the relief of the sufferers by famine in Southern India, and that, while the scourge of scarcity was made by God a means of winning the heathen to the religion of love, alms were again offered for the spiritual training of these hosts of Catechumens. (2) That of the 35,000 who have thus been attracted to Christianity, no appreciable number have turned back; but that, in the words of Bishop Caldwell, the new converts seem more in earnest than the old, and teachers of their own race have been found sufficient in number and of competent powers. (3) That in Japan the new Missions have grown with a rapidity that mingles anxiety with thankfulness. (4) That in China the scourge of famine seems likely to be overruled in God's Providence to the furtherance of the Gospel. (5) That in Guiana the thousands of Coolies from China and India have been in a way in which it is impossible to explain on ordinary principles, attracted to the Gospel.

"We acknowledge at the same time that we have ample subject for humiliation before God in the thought of the inadequate equipment of our Missionary army hitherto.

"We must confess that we have not given largely of our most learned and noblest to this Divine Work, and that we have been prone to murmur if great results have not been accomplished by inadequate means: while of our silver and gold our offerings have been meagre and poor."

One special subject of Intercession the Lambeth Conference has recommended in the following words:

"As our Divine LORD has so closely connected the unity of his followers with the world's belief in His own Mission from the FATHER, it seems to us that Intercession for the enlargement of His Kingdom may well be joined with earnest prayer that all who profess faith in Him may be one fold under one Shepherd."

The Treasurer's Accounts for the year are submitted herewith.

## APPENDIX B.

REPORT ON RE-ARRANGEMENT OF THE MISSIONARY  
WORK OF THE DIOCESE.

TO THE RIGHT REVEREND THE LORD BISHOP,  
AND THE DIOCESAN SYNOD OF FREDERICTON:

The Committee appointed at the last session of the Diocesan Synod to confer with his Lordship the Bishop and report to this Synod at its next session a plan whereby a re-arrangement of the Missionary work of the Diocese may be effected, beg to submit the following Report:—

Your Committee, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, issued to each Clergyman in the Diocese a form of Returns, containing the following questions:

1. Are the present bounds of your Mission the best that can be arranged?
2. If not, what arrangement do you consider desirable and feasible?
3. Is there any portion of your Mission strong enough to be set off as a separate Mission?
  - (a) What would be the boundaries of such new Mission?
  - (b) State particulars, as to the number of Church people, probable contributions, and services at present held.
4. What would be the probable contributions from the remainder of the original Mission?
5. Can you suggest any adjacent district not at present connected with your Mission which might be advantageously combined with it?

The answers given to these questions, in those cases where returns have been made, have furnished your Committee with much valuable information concerning the present existing Missionary work of the Diocese, and also plainly shew great need of still further re-arrangement in the future. After careful consideration on the information so received, your Committee are prepared to submit the following alterations of certain Missionary boundaries:

- I. (a) That a new Mission be formed from portions of the present Missions of Cambridge and Springfield, to be called the Mission of Waterborough. The said Mission to consist of Young's Cove, Rapids, Cody's, Goshen, and the English settlement; provided the sum of \$300 can be raised in the said Mission.
- (b) That the Mission of Cambridge then consist of the Parish of Cambridge alone, containing two Churches and two Mission stations.

(c) That the Mission of Springfield then consist of the Parish of Springfield and that part of the Parish of Norton known as Norton Station, on the Intercolonial Railway.

II. (a) That a new Mission be formed from portions of the present existing Missions of Woodstock and Richmond, to be called the Mission of Wakefield, the said Mission to consist of Jacksontown and Belleville; provided that the sum of \$200 be raised in the said Mission.

(b) That the Mission of Woodstock then consist of the town of Woodstock alone, to be worked by the Rector without an assistant.

(c) That the Mission of Richmond remain as heretofore, with the exception of the removal from it of Belleville, which will form a part of the new Mission of Wakefield.

III. That a new Mission be formed on the north side of the Grand Lake, to be called Grand Lake Mission, and to include the Mission stations of Newcastle, Douglas Harbour, Ironbound Cove, Gaspereaux, Salmon Creek, Hardwood Ridge, and Little River; provided the sum of \$200 be raised in the said Mission.

As a portion of the Missionary work in this proposed new Mission has been performed by the Rector of Maugerville, it will be necessary to attach some additional station or stations to the Mission of Maugerville; and your Committee would recommend that the lower part of the Parish of Maugerville form one such station, and the lower part of the Parish of St. Mary's form a second, with the consent of the Rector of St. Mary's.

Your Committee are not unmindful that several other changes might in time be made with advantage, such as the division of the Counties of Albert, Gloucester, and Restigouche, which now contain only three Missions, those of Albert, Bathurst, and Restigouche; but, for the present, they desire to confine themselves to the foregoing recommendations for the careful consideration of the members of the Synod.

All of which is respectfully submitted, after conference with the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

## APPENDIX C.

## CANON

*For the appointment and election of a Bishop Coadjutor.*

## AS FINALLY PASSED.

1. Whenever either at the request of the Bishop of the Diocese, or without such request, should the Bishop be mentally incapacitated, the Synod shall by resolution declare it to be advisable that a Bishop Coadjutor for the Diocese should be appointed, the election of such Coadjutor shall, either at the meeting of the Synod at which such resolution shall be passed, or at any subsequent annual meeting, or at a special meeting to be called for that purpose, be proceeded with in the manner hereinafter provided.
2. The Bishop shall submit to the Synod the name or names of one or more persons in Holy Orders in the Church of England and Ireland in Canada, or in some Church in full communion therewith, for election as such Bishop Coadjutor.
3. Upon such nomination being made by the Bishop, the Synod shall proceed to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor.
4. Such election shall be by ballot, and the votes of at least two-thirds of the Clergy present, and two-thirds of the lay delegates present, shall be required to elect such Coadjutor.
5. Should the Synod fail to elect on such nomination, the Bishop may make a further nomination, and so from time to time; and the election upon any such further nomination shall be proceeded with as hereinbefore provided.
6. Should the Bishop decline to make a further nomination, in such case the proceedings for the election of a Bishop Coadjutor shall cease for that session.
7. Should the Bishop at any time become so incapacitated by mental infirmity as to be unable to discharge the duties of his office, the Synod may, if it see fit, proceed to the election of a Bishop Coadjutor in like manner as in the case of a vacancy in the See.
8. When any person is duly elected Bishop Coadjutor, it shall be the duty of the Bishop, or of the Synod, forthwith to notify the Metropolitan of such election, in order that the consecration of such Coadjutor may be proceeded with as in the case of Bishops of Sees in the Province of Canada.
9. The Bishop Coadjutor elect shall, before his consecration, make and subscribe before the Metropolitan, or some person appointed by him, the following declaration:

- "I, A. B., elected Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Fredericton, do promise that I will teach and maintain the doctrine and discipline of the Church of England. And I do also declare that I consent to be bound by all the rules and regulations which have been made, or which may hereafter be made by the Synod of the said Diocese; and I hereby agree immediately to resign the said office of Coadjutor, together with all the rights and emoluments appertaining thereto, if sentence requiring such resignation shall at any time be passed upon me, after due examination and trial had by the Tribunal appointed by the Synod of the Diocese for the trial of a Bishop, saving all right of appeal allowed by the said Synod."
10. The said declaration, or a certified copy thereof, shall be forthwith filed with the Secretary of the Synod.
  11. The Bishop Coadjutor shall perform such Diocesan duties, and exercise such Episcopal functions, as the Bishop may assign him; or, in case of the mental incapacity of the Bishop, such duties and functions as the Bishop himself might have exercised but for such incapacity.
  12. Should any difference arise between the Bishop and his Coadjutor relative to their respective rights and duties, it shall be referred to, and decided by, the House of Bishops of the Province of Canada.
  13. The Bishop Coadjutor, when duly consecrated, shall have the right of succession to the See of Fredericton, and shall succeed to the same immediately upon its becoming vacant, and shall be installed as Bishop of such See, according to the Canons of the Province of Canada, provided that previous to his installation he make the declaration required of a Bishop chosen by the Canon of 1871 of this Diocese.
  14. The Bishop Coadjutor shall have a seat in the Diocesan Synod, and the same right of voting therein as any Priest of the Diocese sitting in such Synod.
  15. The provisions of this Canon so far as they relate to nomination by the Bishop shall not extend beyond the Episcopate of the present Diocesan, unless the Synod shall otherwise order.

## APPENDIX D.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS OF DIVINITY SCHOOL

AS FINALLY ADOPTED.

I. The Governing Body of said School shall be his Lordship the Bishop of the Diocese, with four clergymen and four laymen, members of the Synod. Such clergymen and laymen to be elected annually by the Synod by nomination and ballot.

II. The Bishop of the Diocese shall be the Visitor of the School, and shall be authorised to prepare from time to time such Rules and Regulations as he may deem necessary for its internal government, subject to the control of the Governing Body, and in conjunction with the Principal of the said School shall, subject as aforesaid, prescribe the course of study therein.

III. The general management of the School, and the collection and control of all funds for its support shall be vested in the Governing Body.

IV. The Principal of the said School shall be a Clergyman in Priest's orders, and shall be nominated by the Bishop, subject to the approval of the majority of the other Members of the Governing Body.

V. Any Officer of the School may be dismissed by the vote of a majority of all the members of the Governing Body.

VI. The Visitor shall have power to suspend any Officer of the School, provided that he shall forthwith summon a meeting of the Governing Body to be held within one month from the date of such suspension, and shall submit for their consideration and decision his reasons for such suspension.

VII. The Governing Body shall meet at Fredericton for the transaction of general business on the second Wednesday in January in each year.

VIII. Special meetings may be called at any time by the Bishop, or in case of his absence or inability to act, by any three members of the Governing Body. Notices of all meetings shall be sent by post, except when the Synod is in Session, to the address of each member, at least seven days before the time of such meetings.

IX. A majority of the Governing Body, of whom the Bishop shall be one, shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business, provided that in case of the absence of the Bishop a majority of the other members may elect a Chairman and proceed with the business.

## APPENDIX F.

### STANDING RESOLUTIONS OF DIFFERENT SESSIONS HAVING THE FORCE OF LAW.

Third Session (Journal, p. 11)—That the Certificates of Lay Delegates to the Synod be immediately forwarded by the Chairman of the meeting at which they are elected, to the Secretary of the Synod, who shall examine them, and report to the Synod, when it assembles, the names of those duly elected.

Seventh Session (Journal, p. 17.)—That Notices of Motion to be submitted to the Synod, shall be sent to the Secretary at least one month previous to its annual meeting; that the Secretary shall cause such Notices to be printed in the order in which they are received, and forwarded to the members with the usual notice of the Synod meeting; and that Motions of which notice is thus given shall not necessarily exclude other Motions, but shall have priority of consideration.
