

JOURNAL OF SYNOD.
THIRTEENTH SESSION,
1882.

WEDNESDAY, JULY 5th.

Pursuant to notice, published in the *Royal Gazette* in accordance with the 13th Article of the Constitution, the Synod of the Diocese of Fredericton met on this day in the School Room of Trinity Church, in the City of St. John, at half-past nine o'clock, A. M.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese in the Chair.
Prayers.

The Lord Bishop read the resignation of the Rev. Francis Partridge, Secretary of the Synod.

Moved by the Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by the Hon. Judge Wilkinson, that the Rev. O. S. Newnham be requested to act as Secretary *pro tem.*, and that a Committee of two be appointed, to whom, with the Secretary, shall be referred all Certificates of Lay Delegates, and all assessments paid, to report concerning the same as soon as possible. *Carried.*

The Chairman appointed Rev. Canon Brigstocke and Mr. T. Barclay Robinson to be such Committee.

At noon, the Committee having reported, the Secretary *pro tem.* called the roll of the Clergy and Lay Delegates, and certified that a quorum of both Orders was present. The following (except those printed in *italics*.) answered to their names:

Synod met pursuant to adjournment.

That the election be by ballot, a plurality of votes to elect.

Moved in amendment by Mr. Andrew Rainsford, seconded by Mr. W. M. Jarvis,

That the election be by open vote.

The amendment was carried.

Moved by Mr. W. J. Gilbert, seconded by Rev. J. H. Talbot,

That Rev. Canon Medley be appointed to the office of Secretary of this Synod.

Moved by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by Mr. E. J. Wetmore,

That Rev. O. S. Newnham be appointed Secretary.

Moved by Rev. J. E. Flewelling, seconded by Rev. L. A. Hoyt,

That Rev. Thomas Neales be Secretary of this Synod.

On the vote being taken, Rev. Canon Medley was declared duly elected.

Moved by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by Mr. John Sears,

That the order of business be suspended, and that Rev. W. A. Holbrook, a clergyman of the Sister Church of the United States, be granted a seat on the floor of this house. *Carried.*

The like courtesy was extended to Rev. Mr. Jones of the Diocese of Maine. Both gentlemen were welcomed by the Lord Bishop on behalf of the Synod, and having addressed the Synod, took their seats on the platform.

The newly elected Secretary then thanked the members of the Synod for the honor conferred upon him, and took his seat at the table.

A communication from the Provincial Synod of Canada, concerning the Missionary Diocese of Algoma was then read by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, as follows :

The Metropolitan begs to inform the Prolocutor that the House of Bishops has passed the following resolution and requests the concurrence of the Lower House.

JOHN FREDERICTON, Metropolitan.

Resolved, That this House is prepared to give effect to the wishes of the Lower House as expressed in their resolution of yesterday, but that this House deems it expedient that this Synod should pledge itself to use every effort to induce the several Dioceses of this Ecclesiastical Province to contribute such sums respectively as will afford an income of \$4,000 *per annum*, for the support of the Bishop of Algoma for a term of five years ; and this House recommends the following scale :

Concurred in by the Lower House.

On motion, the communication was received and laid on the table.

The Lord Bishop referred to a communication received by him from the Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia concerning the co-operation of the Synod of this Diocese in the maintenance of King's College, Windsor.

On motion, the Secretary was directed to make a minute of the same.

Mr. T. Barclay Robinson presented the following Memorial from the Parish of St. Paul, Portland :

To The Right Reverend THE LORD BISHOP of Fredericton ;
The Reverend THE CLERGY ; and
The REPRESENTATIVES OF THE LAITY, of the Church of England in the
Diocese of Fredericton in Synod assembled.

The Memorial of the Rector, and of the Rector, Church Wardens, and Vestry of the Parish of Saint Paul, in the Town of Portland, in the City and County of Saint John,

Humbly Sheweth :

That the Parish of Saint Paul was set off from the Parish of Portland, and established as a Parish for all purposes Ecclesiastical or relating to the Church of England under authority of an Act of Assembly (19 Vic. c. 50) passed in 1856, which provided as follows :—
“That from and after the second Monday in May, in the present year, that part of the Parish of Portland, in the County of Saint John, which lies to the Eastward of a line drawn along the centre of the street passing over the Mill Bridge, and extending Northwardly to the Kennebecasis River, shall be and the same is hereby declared to be a separate and distinct Parish for all purposes Ecclesiastical or relating to the Church of England, by the name of ‘the Parish of Saint Paul ;’”—and, further, that “all and every the clauses, enactments and provisions of Title XXVIII, Chapter 107 of the Revised Statutes, ‘of the Church of England,’ shall extend to the said Parish of Saint Paul, erected by this Act, as fully and effectually as if herein specially enacted.”

That certain persons claiming to be members of the Church of England have recently erected a proprietary chapel within the limits of the said Parish, and in the vicinity of the Parish Church, and services professedly in connection with the Church of England have been conducted therein by the Reverend JOHN M. DAVENPORT, who claims to hold the license of the Bishop of the Diocese, contrary to the expressed dissent and protest of your memorialists.

That your memorialists are advised that such services and proceedings are contrary to the law of the Church of England, both in England itself, and in New Brunswick.

That your memorialists believe that such proceedings are a great injustice to the lawful Rector of this Parish, and will put an end to all security enjoyed by the Clergy in their ministrations, and prove a serious injury to the Church in this Diocese.

Your memorialists, therefore, beg most respectfully to call the attention of your Lordship and the Synod to the subject, and to express the hope that it will be taken into your most serious consideration.

The minutes of the previous day's proceedings were read, and on motion, confirmed.

That Professor Spencer, Vice-President of King's College, Windsor, be invited to a seat on the floor of the Synod.

Carried.

The Lord Bishop welcomed Prof. Spencer, and invited him to take a seat on the platform.

Moved by Rev. L. G. Stevens, seconded by Rev. James Neales,

That the thanks of this Synod be extended to Rev. O. S. Newnham for his services of yesterday as Secretary *pro temp.*

Carried.

The Bishop then addressed the Synod on the subject of the Memorial from the Parish of S. Paul, Portland, signifying his desire to waive his right to appoint a Committee on the same, and requesting the members of the Synod to perform this duty.

**EIGHTH REPORT
OF THE
BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS
FOR THE DIOCESE OF FREDERICTON.**

(Established by the Diocesan Synod A. D. 1874.)

To the Diocesan Synod of Fredericton :

At the last meeting of the Synod, the Board of Foreign Missions of this Diocese, established by the Synod A. D. 1874, was divided into two Boards, to be known hereafter as the Board of Foreign Missions and the Board of Domestic Missions; the former Board not being interfered with, as already constituted, beyond limiting its duties to the aiding of mission work among Jews and Heathen in countries beyond this Dominion.

The members of this Board therefore beg respectfully to report that, subsequently, at a meeting held conjointly with the Board of Domestic Missions, the Rev. Canon Brigstocke was appointed joint Secretary, and W. M. Jarvis, Esq., joint Treasurer of the two Boards. After which, the Board of Foreign Missions met from time to time without any very practical results beyond consulting together what best might be done, and receiving and answering one or two communications sent by the Board of Foreign Missions of the Provincial Synod.

Further, the operations of your Board, during the past year, have been confined to mission work outside the Dominion connected with three Societies:—*The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, The Church Missionary Society, and The Society for Promoting Christianity amongst the Jews*, to whom remittances, as shown in the Treasurer's account, were made.

Your Board, while refraining from going into any lengthened details with regard to the two great Missionary Societies of the Church of England, and its oldest and chiefest Society in connection with the Promotion of Christianity amongst the Jews, feels bound to express its thankfulness for the good measure of success which has been vouchsafed to all of them during the past year.

"The Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts," which held its 181st Anniversary meeting on the 25th of last April, reports its gross receipts to be £134,978 17s. 8d. for the past year, and that during the same period its regular income had increased over £4,000. The number of ordained missionaries on the Society's list was 594, of whom 188 are returned as laboring in this Dominion, and the remaining 406 amongst British subjects in other Colonies and Dependencies of Great Britain. Amongst other items in its report it is

stated that an English Bishop was to be sent to Japan, to be selected by the Archbishop of Canterbury, and that his stipend was to be provided for by the two great Missionary Societies, to which they had consented. The Report also contains letters from the Bishops of the various Dioceses which had been assisted by the Society's funds, setting forth the permanent spiritual results of its labors which had come within their cognizance, full of interesting statements relative to the past, and holding out encouraging hopes for the future.

"The Church Missionary Society" held its 83rd Anniversary on the 2nd of last May. Its field is the Heathen World, and its sole object is to win souls to Christ. The Report for the past year was of the most encouraging character, the gross receipts amounting to £212,910 11s. 9d., and indisputable evidence is afforded therein that by the instrumentality of this Society the purpose for which it exists is, through God's blessing, eminently successful. The Society, or the native churches dependant upon it, have now 417 clergymen, 2,252 lay agents and 537 female agents (not including missionaries wives); total, 3,206, including those who are laboring in the North-West of this Dominion. Its operation is carried on in more than forty different languages. And one more interesting fact is that nearly 300 of the Society's native converts have been admitted to holy orders, of whom upwards of 200 are still laboring in connection with it. On the river Niger all the clergy are colored men, with a colored Bishop at their head. At Sierra Leone not only are the clergy colored men, but they are supported by their own people. As is also the case in some parts of India.

The London Society for Promoting Christianity amongst the Jews held its 74th Anniversary meeting on the 5th of last May, reporting an income of £37,055 19s. 2d. exceeding that of the former year by upwards of £2,800, which was a source of much gratification to the Committee and its friends, as being one evidence, among others, of an increase of zeal for missions to Israel. It is difficult to understand how members of the Church of England can fail to take an interest in the welfare of the Jewish people. Using as we do Jewish records, and Jewish formularies; singing as we do the songs of Zion, how is it possible not to take a deep interest in the promotion of Christianity amongst the Jews? The fearful persecutions and wrongs to which the Jews of Russia, and other places of Europe, have been subjected, have doubtless drawn more attention towards them, increasing the sympathy and efforts of the Christian Church in their behalf, while at the same time they may be preparing that ancient people to turn unto the Lord, when his word shall be fulfilled. "They shall remember me in far countries; they shall call upon me and I will hear them, and I will say, It is my people." With regard to the progress of mission work amongst them, which is certainly bound up with obstacles and impedi-

ments unknown in any other mission field, there is much to encourage those whose expectation is from the Lord. Thus, one of the Society's missionaries, the Rev. Dr. Stern, has himself within the last ten years baptized nearly two hundred Jews and Jewesses; and the baptismal register in the Chapel of the Society in Palestine Place, London, which till within the last few years was the centre of the Society's Home Mission, contains the names of more than 800 Jewish people who during the last twenty years publicly avowed their faith in Christ crucified.

And in that country where the pioneer missionary laborer, Henry Martyn, gave his life for the Gospel's sake, it is cheering to know that from thence urgent calls have been received from Jews themselves for Christian instruction which have been responded to by the Society, which is now establishing a vigorous, and as it is to be hoped a permanent, mission in Persia.

The sums received by the Board for these Societies during the year 1881-2 have been as follows:—For the Foreign Missions of the S. P. G. \$385.70; for the C. M. S. \$80.66; and for the S. P. C. Jews, \$178.08. The Board gladly notice an increasing interest in the work of Foreign Missions throughout the Diocese, evidenced by an increase in the number of parishes or missions sending contributions from 34 in 1879-80, and 30 in 1880-1, to 39 in the year now closed.

FIRST REPORT
OF THE
BOARD OF DOMESTIC MISSIONS

FOR THE DIOCESE OF FREDERICTON.

(Established by the Diocesan Synod 1881.)

*To the Lord Bishop of Fredericton,
and members of the Diocesan Synod:*

Your Board of Domestic Missions, having been only established one year, has no lengthened report to make of its labors; nevertheless, there are several points of interest connected with its work to which it gladly draws attention.

We record with pleasure that a much larger sum than last year has been contributed to the Diocese of Algoma, and that some contributions have been received for the North-West Missions. By the Treasurer's report of last year, it will be seen that the total amount raised for that Diocese was \$464.72; while during the year just ended it was \$788.52, showing an increase of \$323.80. This sum does not include all that is contributed to Algoma, as some parishes which support children in the Indian Homes send direct to the Homes, and not through our Diocesan Treasurer. Seventeen dollars and fifty-three cents have been received for the North-West. The details of these amounts will appear in the Treasurer's report.

In the month of April an appeal to the Clergy and Laity was issued, calling attention to the claims of Algoma and the North-West Territory, as well as reminding them of the appointed day of Intercession for Missions. As regards that day we would here say, that it seems to be very generally considered an inconvenient season for its special work. We nevertheless trust that until any change be duly made, it will be regularly observed in every Parish, that so united intercession may not cease to be offered up on behalf of the Church's unity, and the extension of her Missionary work.

Turning to the field of labor committed to our care, we find several points worthy of record. On the 7th December, 1881, the Bishop of Algoma was taken to his rest, and our Missionary Diocese was deprived of its faithful, loved, and devoted Head. During the eight years of his Episcopate his labors were abundant, and were carried on amid much discouragement, and with much self denial. His untiring zeal, his simple devotion, and his deep piety, made him the loved friend and trusted counsellor of his Diocese, and leaves an example worthy of close imitation. His work, necessarily arduous and difficult, was eminently

successful. During his short Episcopate the number of the Clergy increased from seven to fifteen; Church buildings from nine to forty; and the congregations from fifteen to upwards of ninety. We believe that no more rapid progress has been made in any Diocese on the Continent, and that the Church may look with pride and thankfulness on this her first Missionary venture. To fill the vacant See the Provincial Synod was summoned by the Metropolitan to meet in Montreal on April 27th. It did so with much anxiety, as the question arose whether or not Algoma should be maintained as a separate Diocese. We rejoice to say that after full deliberation the Synod resolved to maintain it, and to ask the Church to make the salary of the Bishop \$4,000 per annum. The first nomination was the Rev. Edward Sullivan, D. D., Rector of St. George's Church, Montreal, who was unanimously elected. The Church is to be congratulated on the appointment, and will, we trust, show her appreciation of the noble self-sacrifice made by Dr. Sullivan in accepting it, by giving him at all times her full sympathy, and much self-denying help. We are credibly, though unofficially, informed that the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts has made a grant of £1,000 towards the endowment of the See of Algoma on conditions that a sum of £4,000 be raised elsewhere for the same object within the next five years. We trust that the sum required will be raised, that so the grant of the S. P. G. may be secured.

By the North-West Territories is to be understood that vast extent of Country comprised within the four Dioceses of Ruperts Land, Moosonee, Saskatchewan and Athabasca, but the attention of the Church is more especially directed to the Diocese of Ruperts Land, out of which the others were formed, and in which the Province of Manitoba is situated. All are aware of the great and rapid increase of population in that country, and it is easily seen that except the resources of the Church are very largely increased it is quite impossible for her to meet her requirements. To assist in doing so, is the Church in Canada being called to the work, and she has already made a beginning. In a communication from the Bishop of Ruperts Land which appeared in the *Montreal Gazette*, April 27, it is stated that within the present year \$600 had been received from the Central Board, \$600 from the Diocese of Quebec, and \$350 from St. James' Cathedral, Toronto. Before the year closes, we hope that many further sums will be added to those received.

The idea is prevalent that the settlers have more or less of capital, and therefore require no help from the older Dioceses of Canada, or elsewhere. On this point we quote the Bishop of Ruperts Land: "I am afraid," he says, "from what we learn, that many Churchmen in Canada do not realize the situation of these settlers. It is said that a number of Church farmers, having obtained a considerable sum from

"the sale of property in the old Provinces, have come with means to us. Farmers doing this, I presume, usually have several sons for whom they take free homesteads in our West. By the time they have built houses on these and stocked their farms at an expense unknown in Ontario, probably few of them have for a year or two any spare money. It is said too, that many earnest Churchmen of means have left parishes in the old Provinces west, who should enable us to get on very well for ourselves. We should be glad to be furnished with the names of such Churchmen. . . . As a fact most of our immigrants have little or no capital left after they arrive here, and lay out two or three hundred dollars in necessaries."

It is clear that if the Church of England does not come forward liberally at this juncture she will lose for ever the honor that now awaits her of being the Church in that country. On this point we quote the words of one not of us, and which will be taken as an impartial judgment. The author of "From Ocean to Ocean," thus writes: "The duty that now devolves upon the Episcopal Church in Canada is to follow up its own children settling all over the North-West, and to give them the form of service to which they are so profoundly attached. . . . If they neglect the duty of the present they can never occupy hereafter the position in the North-West to which they are historically entitled."

Most earnestly therefore we commend the work before us in Algoma and the North-West to the hearty support of the Churchmen and the Churchwomen of the Diocese, trusting that every Parish will make towards it a yearly contribution. In enriching others, we enrich ourselves, for he that watereth shall be watered also himself.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

To the Lord Bishop of Fredericton and members of the Diocesan Synod :

The Committee on Sunday Schools beg to report as follows :

That owing to the Chairman, the Rev. E. S. W. Pentreath, leaving the Diocese during the year, your Committee have not been able to accomplish much. They have however pleasure in believing that the work of Sunday Schools is gradually developing, and becoming more and more throughout the Diocese a regular and efficient part of the work of the Church.

In Saint John the Teachers' Association continues its work with unabated interest. Its usual tri-monthly meetings and services have been regularly held.

The united Service of children of the various schools in the Deanery of St. John, was held in Trinity Church on Ascension Day, and was of particular interest, the Church being crowded in every part, and the children joining heartily in the service.

Several Teachers offered themselves as candidates at the Sunday School Teachers' Examination in connection with the Church of England Sunday School Institute, England, in May 1881, some of whom gained First Class Certificates, duly signed by the Archbishop of Canterbury and York, and the rest obtained Second Class.

Ten Teachers were Candidates at the present year's examination, the result of which has not yet been ascertained.

Your Committee draw attention to the work of the St. John Teacher's Association for the purpose of pressing the formation of similar Associations in every Deanery of the Diocese, and hope that before another year passes many others will be formed.

Moved by the Bishop Coadjutor, seconded by Rev. James Neales,

That a Committee of five be appointed to consider and report upon the best means of promoting uniformity in keeping the parochial registers in the Diocese, and on all matters connected therewith. *Carried.*

The Chairman appointed the following Committee: the Bishop Coadjutor, Revs. Canons Brigstocke and Medley; Mr. G. Sidney Smith and Mr. E. B. Chandler.

On motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Rev. T. E. Dowling, the order of business was suspended to allow of notice of motion.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Rev. T. E. Dowling,

That the next Annual Meeting of this Synod be held in Fredericton on the Wednesday before the first Thursday in July, 1883. *Carried.*

Professor Spencer then addressed the Synod on the subject of King's College, Windsor; after which, the Lord Bishop gave an address on the same subject.

Moved by the Rev. T. E. Dowling, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

Whereas, It is found impracticable, in the present state and prospects of the finances of this Diocese to establish a Divinity School in connection with this Synod;

And whereas, The University of King's College, Windsor, is in danger, by reason of the withdrawal of State aid, of being seriously crippled in its work, if not of ceasing to exist as a University;

And whereas, That institution is the only distinctive Church University in the Maritime Provinces; and it is highly advisable that its present state of efficiency should not, in the interests of the Church, be allowed to be impaired;

Therefore Resolved, That this Synod, recognizing the necessity of preserving intact the ancient rights and privileges of that University, and of maintaining the connection of the Christian Faith with higher education, desires to support it with such moral and material aid as may be possible; and recommends that such Divinity Students as desire it should be encouraged to pursue their studies there.

Carried unanimously.

On motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, the order of business was suspended to allow of notice of motion.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

That the alterations in that part of the Constitution relating to the Standing Committee, passed by a majority of both orders at the last session of this Synod (12th Session, 1881, Page 21) be now finally adopted. *Carried.*

On motion of Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Rev. John Lockward, the order of business was suspended to allow of notice of motion.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Rev. John Lockward,

That the 4th Rule of the Boards of Missions, adopted at the last meeting of the Synod, be altered to read as follows :

4. There shall be, so soon as possible after the Annual Meeting of the Synod in each year, a joint meeting of the said Boards, which shall be summoned by the Lord Bishop, at which meeting a joint Treasurer for both Boards, and also a joint Secretary, or a separate Secretary for each Board, as shall from year to year be deemed best, shall be appointed. *Carried.*

On motion of Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by Mr. T. W. Daniel, the order of business was suspended to allow of notice of motion.

Moved by Rev. Canon Brigstocke, seconded by Mr. T. W. Daniel,

That this Synod approves the action of the Provincial Synod taken at its session last April, touching the assessment of three hundred dollars made on this Diocese for the stipend of the Bishop of Algoma, and direct the Board of Domestic Missions to take the necessary steps for the collection and remittance of the same in equal quarterly payments, dating from July 1st, 1882. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. G. Sidney Smith,

That the consideration of the proposed codification and amendment of the Church Act, contained in the Appendix to

the Journal of this Synod for 1878, be proceeded with, and the clauses not yet considered be read section by section. *Carried.*

Mr. W. M. Jarvis's Bill was then taken up, and discussed section by section, beginning with section 26.

The Secretary read the provisions under the head entitled "Parishes," sections 26, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, 32, 33, 34, 35.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

That section 26 be passed, with the words "in their respective parishes" inserted after the word "Church" on line 16. *Carried.*

That section 27 be passed. *Carried.*

That section 28 be passed. *Carried.*

That section 29 be passed. *Carried.*

That section 30 be passed. *Carried.*

That section 31 be passed. *Carried.*

That in section 32 the words "or other places of worship" be struck out; and the word "twenty" be altered to "ten." *Carried.*

That section 33 be passed, leaving out the word "usual." *Carried.*

That section 34 be passed. *Carried.*

That section 35 be passed. *Carried.*

That section 36 be reconstructed to read as follows :

Any person duly inducted into the Rectory of any Church shall be deemed to be the Rector of any other Church in any other Parish, upon being chosen thereto by the parishioners according to law, and upon receiving special license from the Bishop giving him spiritual charge thereof; and there being no other legally licensed Priest or Deacon in holy orders officiating in such other parish; but only until such time as such special license shall be recalled by the Bishop, who shall have full power at any time so to recall the same or any letters of Institution heretofore issued in any like case, whether the same may be issued before or after the passing of this Act; but such Rector shall have no power to fell, cut down, or take

away any of the timber or wood growing on any part of the Glebe without the authority of the Church Wardens and Vestry, in the manner heretofore provided in the twenty-eighth section of this Act.

That section 37 be passed. *Carried.*

That section 38 be passed, with the alteration of the words "upon such election" to "upon the election of the Church Wardens."

Carried.

Mr. W. M. Jarvis moved to adjourn the debate till to-morrow, Friday, to be taken up as the first business in order.

Carried.

On motion, the Synod adjourned till to-morrow, Friday, at 11 A. M.

THIRD DAY'S PROCEEDINGS.

FRIDAY, July 7th, 1882.

The Synod met, pursuant to adjournment.

The Lord Bishop in the Chair.

Prayers.

The roll of Clergy and Laity called, and the attendance marked.

The minutes of the previous day's proceedings were read, and, on motion, confirmed.

The Secretary laid on the table the accounts of the Contingent Fund.

The Chairman appointed Mr. R. T. Clinch a Committee to audit the same.

The debate on the Codification of the Laws relating to the Church was resumed.

Moved by Mr. C. W. Weldon, seconded by Mr. W. M. Jarvis,

That section 38 be reconsidered. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. C. W. Weldon, seconded by Mr. W. M. Jarvis,

In section 38, strike out the word "*such*" and insert "*the*," and after the word "*made*," insert "*of two Church Wardens*

and at least six Vestrymen, all being members of the Church of England in this Diocese and resident in such parish."

Moved in amendment by Mr. Hurd Peters, seconded by Rev. J. E. Flewelling,

That the words "or stated attendants at any Church Service for at least one year previous, in the district so to be erected into a new parish," be added after the words "such parish."

The question being taken on the amendment, it was *lost on a division*, and the original motion being put, it was *Carried*.

Section 39 was then discussed, as printed in the Journal of 1878, but no conclusion arrived at.

On motion, the Synod adjourned till 3 P. M.

After recess, the Synod resumed work at 3 P. M.

The Lord Bishop having intimated that he would be obliged to leave the Synod,

On motion, The Lord Bishop was now requested to leave the Chair, and The Bishop Coadjutor to take the same.

Moved by Rev. Canon Ketchum, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

That the warmest thanks of this Synod be presented to The Lord Bishop for his kind and courteous conduct as presiding over the late proceedings. *Carried by a standing vote.*

The Lord Bishop addressed the Synod in warm words of thanks, and took leave of the Delegates, requesting the Bishop Coadjutor to take the Chair in his absence.

Mr. R. T. Clinch, who was a Committee to audit the Accounts of the Contingent Fund, reported that he had examined them, and found them correct, with the necessary vouchers on hand.

The Bill relating to the Laws of the Church was then resumed at section 39.

Moved by Mr. Hurd Peters, seconded by Mr. G. S. Grimmer, That section 39, printed in the Journal of 1878, be amended to read as follows:

The Bishop of the Diocese, having given three months notice in writing of his intention in the matter, to the Church Corporations of the several parishes interested, may set off

from any parish a district to be attached, for ecclesiastical purposes, to any adjoining parish. And in every such case, the persons resident in such district, or being attendants at public worship therein, shall have all such and the same rights in the election of Church Wardens and Vestrymen and Representatives in Synod, and otherwise, as if residents or attendants at public worship in the parish to which they shall be so attached. In case the Church Corporation of any of the said parishes, or any ten persons entitled to vote at any meeting for the election of Church Wardens and Vestrymen in any of the said parishes shall object thereto, they shall signify their objection to the Bishop by a memorial setting forth the grounds thereof; whereupon the Bishop shall communicate the same to the Standing Committee of the Synod, which, after hearing all parties interested, shall decide on the merits of the case; and if they shall be of opinion, that notwithstanding such objection, the said district should be set off, the Bishop shall thereupon set off the same as if such objection had not been made.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hurd Peters, seconded by Mr. W. M. Jarvis,

That section 40 be amended to read as follows:

The Bishop of the Diocese may, upon the application of ten persons in any parish entitled to vote at any meeting for the election of Church Wardens and Vestrymen, set off from any such parish or from such parish and an adjoining parish or parishes, a district to constitute a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes; provided that the Bishop shall first give to the Church Corporation of every parish, any part of which may be included in the limits of such new parish, three months notice in writing of his intention so to do. In case the Church Corporation of any of the said parishes or ten persons entitled to vote at any meeting for the election of Church Wardens and Vestrymen in any of the said parishes shall object thereto, they shall signify their objection to the Bishop by a memorial setting forth the grounds thereof; whereupon the Bishop shall communicate the same to the Standing Committee of the Synod, which, after hearing all parties interested, shall decide on the merits of the case, and if they shall be of opinion that,

notwithstanding such objection, the said district should be set off, the Bishop may thereupon set off the same as if such objection had not been made. And a memorial of the setting off such proposed parish and of the bounds and limits thereof, under the hand and seal of the Bishop of the Diocese, shall be registered at full length in the office of the Registrar of Deeds for the County wherein the same is situate, who is hereby required to receive and register the same with the records and Deeds of the said County, on payment of the like fees as he is entitled to receive for the registry of Deeds; and from and after the registry of such memorial the said districts shall be and continue as a separate parish for ecclesiastical purposes under the terms of this Act; and such memorial shall at all times be evidence that all the acts required by this section have been duly performed.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

That section 41 read as follows:

A meeting of the persons entitled in each parish to vote in the election of Church Wardens and Vestrymen shall be held on Easter Monday in each year.

Moved in amendment by Rev. E. P. Flewelling, seconded by Rev. J. H. S. Sweet,

That the words "Easter Monday" be struck out, and the words "during Easter week" be inserted instead.

On the question being taken, the amendment was *Lost.*

With the consent of the mover and seconder, the following addition was made to the original resolution:

"Notice given in each Church or Chapel of Ease within the parish, where Service shall be held on the Sunday before the day of such meeting, shall be sufficient."

The question being taken, section 41, with this addition, was

Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

That section 42 be passed as printed in the Journal of 1878.

Moved by Rev. T. E. Dowling, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

In the 6th line, after the words "may be elected," to insert the words "and the Church Wardens to be also Communicants of the Church of England."

The question being taken, the amendment was *Lost.*

The section, as moved, was then *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

That section 43 be passed as printed in the Journal of 1878, the word "nineteenth" in the last line being changed to the word "twentieth."

Carried.

That section 24, as printed, be passed.

Carried.

That section 45, as printed, be passed.

Moved by Mr. E. B. Chandler, seconded by Rev. Canon Ketchum,

That the following words be added to this section :

"And in the event of such destruction, all notices, required to be given under section 32, shall be affixed in some public place in the parish instead of the Church or Chapel of Ease."

The question being taken on the section, thus added to, was *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. C. W. Weldon, seconded by Rev. Canon Brigstocke,

That section 46 read as follows :

Where a vacancy occurs in a Vestry by the death, resignation, or removal from the diocese, of a Church Warden or Vestryman, such vacancy may be filled by the Rector, Church Wardens and Vestry, at a special meeting called for that purpose, and the person so elected shall hold the office to which he is so elected in the same manner as if he had been elected under the 42nd section of this Act.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

That section 47, as printed, be passed, thus amended :

In line 7, after the words "majority of, read "the pew-owners or lessees from the Church of pews in such Church or Chapel of Ease;" and in line 12 strike out the words "at such meeting, or within one month after the same shall have been held."

The question being taken, section 47, thus amended, was

Carried.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

That section 48, as printed, be passed. *Carried.*

That section 49, as printed, be passed, thus amended :

On line 5, after the words "lands lie," insert the words "and also in some public place."

Carried.

That section 50, as printed, be passed.

Carried.

That section 51, as printed, be passed, thus amended :

On line 11, that the words "this Province" be struck out, and the words "any Province within the said Dominion of Canada," be inserted instead.

Carried.

That section 52, as printed, be passed.

Carried.

That section 53 read as follows :

If at any time there shall be reason to believe that the property of or held in connection with any parish or Church Corporation, whether the same shall be held as Glebe or Church lands, or on account of the sale thereof, or for any other purpose whatsoever, is not rightly administered, or it shall appear that the same or any part thereof may have been loaned on personal or other security contrary to the foregoing provisions of this Act, it shall be lawful for the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick to direct that legal proceedings may thereupon be taken in such way as may be advised; and all property or moneys recovered, after payment therefrom of all costs and charges of or connected with the recovery of the same, shall from thenceforth be vested in and held by the said Society upon special trust to be invested, and the income thereof shall be paid and applied to the purposes for which the same may have been originally held; provided that this section shall not apply to any parish which shall support a resident Clergyman without aid from the said Society.

Carried.

That section 54, as printed, be passed, thus amended :

On line 1, the word "Fredericton" be struck out, and the words "the Diocese" be inserted instead; and that on line 13,

after the words "Chaptered eighty-four," the words "or of any Act of Parliament whatsoever" be inserted. *Carried.*

That section 55, as printed, be passed, thus amended:

On line 4, after the words "rights acquired," the words "or any bye-law made" be inserted; and that the following words be added at the end of the section: "And provided also that nothing in this Act contained shall affect the existing rights or liabilities of any Rector, Church Wardens or Vestry, duly incorporated, or acting as a Corporation, or any lessees, or any persons claiming under them before the passing of this Act."

Section 55, thus amended and added to, was *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. C. W. Weldon, seconded by Mr. W. M. Jarvis,

That section 8 be recommitted by the substitution of the word "by" instead of the word "of," as printed in the Journal of 1878. *Carried.*

That section 13 be recommitted by the addition of the words "under his corporate seal" after the word "execute," on line 20. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. C. W. Weldon, seconded by Rev. Canon Ketchum,

That the Bill to consolidate and amend various Acts of Assembly relating to the Church of England, as read and passed section by section, be now adopted by the Synod, and The Lord Bishop and the Standing Committee of the Diocese be requested to bring the same before the next session of the Provincial Legislature, and have power to petition in the name of the Synod for the enacting of the same; and also to make or agree to any alterations not affecting the principle of any section of the Bill. *Carried.*

On motion, the Secretary was authorised to affix the seal of the Synod to a petition to the Provincial Legislature, under the direction of the Standing Committee of the Synod.

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. C. W. Weldon,

That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration the present Constitution, Rules of Order, and Canons, adopted

by the Synod, and to report upon the Codification and amendment of the same at the next meeting of the Synod. *Carried.*

The Chairman appointed the Committee, as follows:

Moved by Rev. G. M. Armstrong, seconded by Rev. Canon Ketchum,

That the cordial thanks of this Synod be given to the Committee appointed to consider the codification and amendment of the legal enactments affecting the Church of England in this Diocese. *Carried.*

Moved by Rev. T. Neales, seconded by Mr. R. T. Clinch,

That in accepting the resignation of the office of Secretary of this Synod by the Rev. Francis Partridge, the hearty thanks of this Synod be tendered to him for the courteous and faithful discharge of his duties during his tenure of office. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. W. M. Jarvis, seconded by Mr. R. T. Clinch,

Moved by Rev. Thomas Neales, seconded by Rev. Canon Ketchum,

That the thanks of this Synod be tendered to the proprietors of the lines of railways and steamers for the return fare granted to the Delegates. *Carried.*

Moved by Mr. R. T. Clinch, seconded by Rev. Canon Medley,

That the hearty thanks of this Synod be tendered to the Rector, Church Wardens and Vestry of Trinity Church, St. John, for the use of their School buildings for the late meetings.

Carried.

Moved by Mr. Hurd Peters, seconded by Mr. John Sears,

That the thanks of the Synod be given to the gentlemen connected with the Press of Saint John, for the reports of the proceedings of the meetings, and for the papers furnished to the members of the Synod.

Carried.

The Synod then sang the Doxology; The Bishop Coadjutor pronounced the Benediction, and, on motion, the Synod adjourned.

Resolutions having the force of Standing Orders.

Seventh Session, (Journal, p. 17)—That Notices of Motion to be submitted to the Synod, shall be sent to the Secretary at least one month previous to its annual meeting; that the Secretary shall cause such Notices to be printed in the order in which they are received, and forwarded to the members with the usual notice of the Synod meeting; and that Motions of which notice is thus given shall not necessarily exclude other Motions, but shall have priority of consideration.

Alteration in Article III. of Constitution.

Tenth Session (Journal, p. 2)—That in order to entitle a Substitute to sit in this Synod, the inability of the regularly elected Delegate to attend shall be certified by the Rector or Missionary in charge to the Secretary of the Synod, before such Substitute takes his seat.
